











# Year 1 and 2 knowledge mat - Enchanted Woodlands

## Key vocabulary

<b>event</b> An important thing that happens. 	<b>National Forest</b> A big forest created in the Midlands. 
<b>local</b> Something that is close to where we live. 	<b>change</b> When something becomes different. 
<b>past</b> Things that have happened. 	<b>conservation</b> Looking after nature and the environment. 
<b>trees</b> Tall plants with branches, trunk and leaves. 	<b>Rosliston Forestry Centre</b> Woodland forestry attraction.

## Sticky knowledge

In 1995, people started to plant 120,000 trees at Rosliston, which was once farmland and fields. This was part of starting the National Forest project.



The National Forest is important for recreation and forestation.

You can find both human and physical features at Rosliston:  
**Physical features:** footpaths, playground and picnic area, carpark, visitors centre.  
**Human features:** lake, woodland, meadow, trees, pond and stream.

It was planted to improve the environment, provide more wildlife habitats, create a forest for the future and change land that had no trees.
